The bulk of Elliott's correspondence is personal and is from friends from the United States and around the world congratulating Elliott on her exhibitions and providing updates on their lives. Some letters are written in French. Often, letters are signed with first names only. Scattered printed material includes exhibition announcements, catalogs, and clippings.
