Philanthropist and arts patron Hattie Newcomer Gilpin (1961-1942) lived Baltimore, Maryland. She was married to Henry (Harry) B. Gilpin and they had three children.

- Scope and Ten letters from Daniel Chester French to Hattie Newcomer Gilpin concern the commission of a baptismal font for St. Paul's Church in Baltimore, Maryland. Thirty-six letters from Edwin Davis French concern the execution of engraved book plates. A contract and eighteen letters from John La Farge regard the commission of a stained glass window for Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Baltimore. Also found is a copy of a letter from Gilpin to La Farge.
