Summary: The papers of Japanese American artists Hisako Hibi and Matsusaburo

"George" Hibi measure 5.1 linear feet and date from circa 1906-2022. These papers are mainly focused on Hisako Hibi's life and career, with some content related to her husband Matsusaburo "George" Hibi. Included are biographical material consisting of immigration documents and interview transcripts; scrapbooks; printed material including catalogs and newspaper clippings; personal and professional correspondence; scattered records of works sold, loaned and donated; and a few sketches. Also found is Matsusaburo's handwritten account of founding the art school at Topaz incarceration camp along with other material related to the forced removal and incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II. There is a 1.2 linear foot unprocessed addition to this collection donated in 2023 that includes sketchbooks by Hisako Hibi, a yearbook, letters to Hisako Hibi, printed material, and membership cards. Materials date from circa

1929-2000.

Biographical / Historical

Hisako Hibi née Shimizu (1907-1991) was a Japanese American artist in Hayward and San Francisco, California. She was married to artist Matsusaburo "George" Hibi (1886-1947). Both artists were active members of the San Francisco Bay Area arts community. The two met at the California School of Fine Arts (renamed the San Francisco Art Institute, which closed in 2022) and married in 1930. They had two children, Satoshi and Ibuki. Both Hisako and Matsusaburo "George" Hibi exhibited their paintings widely.

In 1942, the entire Hibi family was forcibly removed and incarcerated at the Tanforan Assembly Center in California and subsequently the Topaz Relocation Center in Utah where they remained until the end of World War II. After the war, the family moved to New York City, where Matsusaburo "George" Hibi passed away in 1947. Hisako Hibi worked as a seamstress at a garment factory and later studied painting at the Museum of Modern Art. In the early 1950s, Hisako Hibi and her daughter Ibuki returned to San Francisco. Hisako Hibi continued to exhibit frequently in group and solo shows. She passed away in 1991.

Scope and Contents

The papers of Japanese American artists Hisako Hibi and Matsusaburo "George" Hibi measure 5.1 linear feet and date from circa 1906-2022. These papers are mainly focused on Hisako Hibi's life and career, with some content related to her husband Matsusaburo "George" Hibi. Included are biographical material consisting of immigration documents and interview transcripts; scrapbooks; printed material including catalogs and newspaper clippings; personal and professional correspondence; scattered records of works sold, loaned and donated; and a few sketches. Also found is Matsusaburo's handwritten account of founding the art school at Topaz incarceration camp along with other material related to the forced removal and incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II. A small addition to this collection consisting of letters (many handmade) to Hisako Hibi from friends and fellow artists was merged in with the rest of the correspondence.

There is a 1.2 linear foot unprocessed addition to this collection donated in 2023 that includes sketchbooks by Hisako Hibi, a yearbook, letters to Hisako Hibi, printed material, and membership cards. Materials date from circa 1929-2000.

Scope and Contents:

This series includes Hisako and Matsusaburo "George" Hibi's marriage license, Matsusaburo Hibi's Japanese passport, short biographical profiles on both artists, transcripts of interviews with Hisako Hibi, assorted writings in English and Japanese, and condition reports on a few of Hisako Hibi's paintings. Also noteworthy are a few subject files related to the forced relocation and incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II. Most of the material is related to the art schools established by Matsusaburo "George" Hibi and fellow Japanese American artist Chiura Obata while they were inside Tanforan and Topaz incarceration camps. The files include writings, documents, exhibition catalogs, correspondence, and a sketch by Matsusaburo Hibi.

Scope and Contents:

This series includes personal and professional correspondence between the Hibis and friends, colleagues, museums, galleries, and other institutions. Especially noteworthy are the letters between Matsusaburo "George" Hibi and the artist Michael Chepourkoff during the Hibi family's time at the Topaz incarceration camp during World War II. There are quite a few handmade cards by various correspondents that are scattered throughout the series.

Scope and Contents:

The bulk of this series consists of scrapbooks compiled by Hisako Hibi about her artwork and exhibitions. The scrapbooks include correspondence, exhibitions announcements and catalogs, clippings, and photographs of Hisako Hibi, her artwork, and exhibition openings and events. There is also one scrapbook commemorating a trip that Hisako Hibi took around the world in 1963 and one scrapbook about Matsusaburo "George" Hibi's artwork and exhibitions.

Scope and Contents:

This series includes a wide range of printed materials such as exhibition announcements and catalogs, magazines, periodicals, clippings, newsletters, program guides, and calendars. Most of the material is related to Hisako and Matsusaburo "George" Hibi's artwork and exhibitions. Some material is regarding other artists the Hibis knew well or were interested in, such as Chiura Obata. There are a few folders containing printed material, usually clippings, on specific subjects, notably the forced removal and incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II.
