## **Biographical / Historical**

Narcissa Swift King (1911-1998) was from Chicago, Illinois. She was active in the Civil Rights Movement. King was the great-granddaughter of Gustavus F. Swift, founder of the Swift meat packing company. She helped found and became the first chairwoman of the Chicago Urban League's woman's board in 1964. King moved to Santa Fe, New Mexico, in 1979, and was active in the arts community there. She was married to Clinton Blair King.
