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Biographical / Historical

Rose Kuper (1888-1987) was an abstract painter in New York City, New York and Whittier, California. Born in Russia, Kuper attended Hunter College in New York and studied with Hans Hofmann and Domenico Paulon. She married Theodore Fred Kuper and raised a daughter while teaching at New York City Public Schools. In 1959, she moved to Los Angeles and continued her painting career. She was a member of the National Association of Women Artists.

Scope and Contents

The papers of painter Rose Kuper measure 0.8 linear feet and date from 1930 to 1993. The papers focus on Kuper's later career from 1940 to the 1970s. Found are biographical materials, scattered correspondence, five notebooks with sketches and writings, photographs of Kuper and works of art, printed material, and pencil sketches.

Scope and Contents:

Biographical materials include a biographical sketch and a resume, a calendar, notes on art, and collages of photographs outlining Kuper's career. Scattered correspondence includes two postcards from Rose Kuper to her husband Fred Kuper while she was in Europe in 1930. Other letters are photocopies and are from Hans Hofmann and Domenico Paulon. Five notebooks contain colored pencil and graphite sketches, notes on art, and personal observations. Photographs depict Kuper with her artwork, exhibitions, and works of art. Also found is a photograph of sculptor Attilio Pucherili. Printed materials consist of clippings, exhibition announcements and catalogs, and press releases concerning Kupers career and her friends, including Abraham Walkowitz. Three pencil sketches by Kuper include unidentified figures and a Christmas card featuring a drawing of Kuper, her husband, and her daughter in their living room.
