Summary: The Thomas Waterman Wood letters measure 0.01 linear feet and date

from 1880-1903. The collection consists of five letters to Miss Ambia Harris, August 27, 1880-March 26, 1903; a note to Mrs. Daniel L. Harris, May 11, 1883, regretting he will be unable to attend her daughter's wedding; and a note on a calling card. The letters convey the friendly relations between Wood and the Harris family, and discuss sitting for portraits, picture framing,

visits to the family, health, and other related matters.

The collection was donated to the Archives of American Art from 1955-1962 by Charles E. Feinberg, an active donor and friend of AAA.

Biographical / Historical

Thomas Waterman Wood (1823-1903) was a painter primarily active in New York, New York, and Montpelier, Vermont. He was known for his portraits and genre paintings of the rural American South. Wood also owned an art gallery beginning in 1891 through which he sold his paintings.
