Notes: FotoCraft Camera Club, founded in 1937, by a group of African

American photographers who met at the 12th Street DC YMCA. One of the founding members was Herbert Scurlock, brother of Addison Scurlock who was a contributor to the Kaleidoscope exhibition.

This folder contains a brochure providing an historical brief of the 12th Street YMCA Fotocraft Camera Club as the oldest camera club in the greater Washington metropolitan area. It also includes copies of the

Fotocraft schedule during 1990-1991.
