A Mamprusi Village, 1944 1 Film reel (20 minutes; black-and-white sound; 702 feet; 16mm) Notes: Edited film produced by the British Ministry of Information depicts daily life in a village of the Northern Territories of the Gold Coast (Ghana) with an emphasis on Mamprusi autonomy under colonial rule. Film shows collection and distribution of tax money under the native administration, council meeting presided over by a Colonial District Commissioner, collection of cola nuts for export to Ivory Coast and locally recruited mounted police acting as customs agents. Also depicted is the judicial system of the native administration and a high court presided over by the Paramount Chief. Also shown are scenes of a family compound of a village chief including women cleaning compound, bathing, smoking and children playing games and scenes of a local market and women carrying goods to the market. Music of African choirs of the Gold Coast forms part of the sound track. HSFA 1996.4.1

Pottery in the Gold Coast, circa 1940

1 Film reel (10 minutes; black-and-white sound; 319 feet; 16mm)

Notes: Edited film produced by the British Ministry of Information documents work at a government training center for pottery making in the Gold Coast Colony (Ghana). Included are scenes of trainees digging clay, transporting it to "weathering pits," mixing clay with water, kneading and wedging clay, weighing it and "throwing" clay on potters wheel. Also shown is partially dried pottery being shaped and smoothed before glazing and firing. A large kiln is opened after firing and cups, plates, bowls and jugs are removed.

Namaqualand and Zululand, circa 1945

Notes:

1 Film reel (11 minutes; black-and-white sound; 372 feet; 16mm)

Edited film from series "The South African Scene," produced by the South African Information Service depicts scenery and other tourist attractions of the coastal regions of Namaqualand and Zululand in South Africa. Film contains scenes of Namaqualand landscapes, waterfalls and spring wildflowers. A journey by car is taken from Namaqualand to Zululanad which crosses Valley of 1,000 Hills. In Zululand scenes include "natives" on Zulu reservation: men swimming, women washing clothes and family selling crafts to tourist. Also shown is the Hluhluwe Game Reserve where a Zulu guide tracks black rhinos and the rare white rhino.
