With Notebook In Hand, circa 1959

1 Film reel (21 minutes; color sound, 728 feet; 16mm)

Notes:

Edited film is the story of the Kreznar family vacation to Florida The youngest daughter is instructed by a teacher to keep a notebook of her experiences in Florida which include visiting a Florida visitor center, setting up camp in a park, watching a water skiing performance, visiting a marine animal park where they watch a dolphin show, touring the Everglades on an air powered boat, riding on a glass bottom boat, viewing bird and animal wildlife and swimming at a beach. Sound is the daughter's narration of their experiences.

Czech Invasion, 1968

1 Film reel (7 minutes; color sound, 220 feet; 16mm)

Notes:

Edited film captures aspects of the Russian invasion of Czechoslovakia. Kreznars were completing the last days of vacation in a Czechoslovakian town when the Russians invaded. The film captures images of Russian soldiers and tanks, Czechs protest marching, makeshift memorials on sites where people were killed, grafitti telling the Russians to go home. Sound is Sonia Kreznar's narration of their experience.

Lens Behind the Iron Curtain, part 1, 1965

1 Film reel (19 minutes; color sound, 692 feet; 16mm)

Notes:

Edited film created by Kreznars during a guided tour of the Soviet Union in 1965. Film consists of footage of Moscow and Leningrad mainly of public places with a special emphasis on historically important buildings. Throughout the footage Kreznar shows modern apartment buildings as they are being constructed, with his commentary discussing the Soviets' efforts to modernize the territories under their control and the recent population growth in these cities. Kreznar is also interested in the modes of public transportation in each city - such as street cars or the metro in Moscow. Kreznar notes that most automobile production in the Soviet Union focuses on trucks for work while cars are considered a rare luxury for private citizens. He also discusses the high volume of pedestrian traffic. Kreznar also takes an interest in religion in this footage, showing churches in disrepair or having been de-sanctified and converted into housing, museums, or other government administrated buildings. Kreznar notes that this is due to the Soviet government's anti-religious policy, but he also shows some churches under recently started restoration due to the government's realization of the touristic value of these sites. Film includes occasional shots of people working, mainly in outdoor produce markets. Women are shown doing road construction in Moscow as well as various public parks, swimming pools, and other public recreation areas, with a special emphasis on how the Soviet government has given children places to play.

Film is broken up into three parts, each with its own opening title screen, although, the narrative seems to be continuous and the footage likely follows the original chronological order of the guided tour. This footage was shot silent with no live audio recorded during the tour. Voiceover audio commentary and background music added by Kreznar during editing.

Notes:

Part 3 of edited film created by Kreznar during a guided tour of the Soviet Union in 1965. Part 3 consists of footage of Tashkent, Bukhara, and Samarkand in Uzbekistan mainly of public places with a special emphasis on historically important buildings. Throughout the footage Kreznar shows modern apartment buildings as they are being constructed, with his commentary discussing the Soviets' efforts to modernize the territories under their control and the recent population growth in these cities. Kreznar is also interested in the modes of public transportation in each city such as street cars although footage of the Uzbek cities include shots of donkeys and carts still being heavily used as a means of transport. Kreznar also takes an interest in religion in this footage, showing churches and mosques in disrepair or having been desanctified and converted into housing, museums, or other government administrated buildings. Kreznar notes that this is due to the Soviet government's anti-religious policy, but he also shows some churches and mosques under recently started restoration due to the government's realization of the touristic value of these sites. Women are shown doing road construction in Tashkent. Film concludes with shot of Muslims praying in public in Samarkand.

Film is broken up into three parts, each with its own opening title screen, although, the narrative seems to be continuous and the footage likely follows the original chronological order of the guided tour. This footage was shot silent with no live audio recorded during the tour. Voiceover audio commentary and background music added by Kreznar during editing.
