Edited film produced by the Hearst Corporation provides a brief survey of the political, economic, and social changes and challenges faced within the African Continent in the 1960's. Filmed during a wide-scale independence movement throughout the continent, the film focuses on how various countries coped with nationalist movements; the push for equal education and career access for non-white Africans; opening elections to accommodate majority rule, and civil unrest. The countries featured are Nigeria, Ghana, Congo, Rhodesia, and South Africa.

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
