## **Scope and Contents**

Edited video focuses on Comisario Faustino and his family, Arhuaco (Ica) peoples, who live in on Sierra Nevada de Santa Marta, Colombia. The losely woven story depicts the life of a comisario, Faustino, who is, in effect, an unpaid constable appointed by the Colombian government. Shown is the mountainous terrain, agriculture as practiced separately by men and women; food preparation; homestead with women and children's activities; Faustino setting up the loom to weave (a man's activity); visiting his father, a local well-respected "priest;" and investigation of a murder; and burial of the murdered victim. The murdered person is Faustino's niece, a member of the Villafana clan. Her boyfriend, Antonio, admits to the killing. Faustino decides the course of action for punishment. At the funeral, narration states that according to custom the murderer must prepare the burial site and the body for burial. Antonio

wraps the body in ferns and prepares the grave where the body is interred sitting up. A cord which is wrapped around the body comes up through the grave where it is wound around a short pole above the grave. Narration states that it is believed that when the cord rots, the soul is released. Antonio is sent away for a formal trial. The family appeals to Faustino for immediate retribution against the boyfriend but they are unsuccessful.

Billipp was assisted by Bob Harris, who operated one of the cameras and carried out some of the editing.
