Marshall Durbin, Associate Professor, Department of Anthropology, Washington, University in St. Louis, Missouri specialized in the study of language, in particular its evolution.

It includes book reviews, correspondence, numerous reprints of articles on indigenous languages, speeches, and sound recordings. Of particular interest are the lists of vocabulary terms in Spanish and/or Athapascan, Carib, and Yucatec Maya.
