Scope and Contents

This collection contains three tales by Jim Peters in Meskwaki syllabary with English translations by Horace Poweshiek. The first is a story about a hunter's mishaps with uncooperative game animals in winter when the people are hungry. The second is a story about a married couple on a hunting trip who, when spied on by Sioux enemies, escape by canoe through the virtue of the wife's childhood fasting visions; the husband tries to get his wife to take the war honors for an enemy they kill en route, but she gives them to her brother in her place; later, during a truce with the Sioux, the husband meets and swaps stories with the men he evaded. The third is a story about a young man who has some adventures with strangers whose language he does not speak; en route home, he and his fellow Meskwakis who came to retrieve him kill two enemies by virtue of their leader's childhood fasting visions, claiming war honors when they reach their camp.
