Scope and Contents

This collection contains nine stories by Bill Leaf, Harry Lincoln, Alfred Kiyana, and Sâkihtanohkwêha, handwritten in Meskwaki syllabary, with English translations by Ida Poweshiek. The texts are Bill Leaf's history of Wâpasaya (White Robe); a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "When Wîsahkêha fed bees to the wolves;" half of Sâkihtanohkwêha's winter story about the Meskwaki culture hero (Wîsahkêha) (the other half is in Manuscript 1875); a winter story by Harry Lincoln whose title can be translated as "Downy Feather;" a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "Downy Feather;" a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "A man who made a sacred pack;" a winter story by Harry Lincoln about a quarrel between Bear and Rabbit; a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "The Indian lead mine;" a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "The Indian lead mines of long ago, who had a lead mine;" a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "The Indian of long ago who was blessed by an owl;" and a winter story by Alfred Kiyana whose title can be translated as "When Wîsahkêha was almost captured by the manitous." (Truman Michelson referred to Sâkihtanohkwêha as Mrs. Bill Leaf).
