Provenance

The collection was donated to the Department of Anthropology by Lispenard Seabury Crocker in 1961 (USNM Accession 232559). It was transferred from the object collections of the Department of Anthropology to the National Anthropological Archives by Chang-su Houchins between 1984 and 1989.

Related Materials

The Department of Anthropology object collections holds Chinese maps collected by Crocker under Accession 232559. Additional objects donated with this collection are held by the Department of Anthropology object collections and the National Museum of American History under Accession 232559 and 272145.

The Library of Congress holds the Edward S. Crocker and Lispenard Seabury Crocker Papers (MSS86263).

Processing Information

The items in this collection were originally cataloged individually by the NAA under numbers MS 7144-MS 7150; MS 7152-MS 7169; MS 7175-MS 7176; MS 7179-MS 7186; MS 7194-MS 7195; MS 7279; MS 7323; MS 7373; MS 7419; MS 7453-MS 7457; MS 7473; MS 7475; and MS 1998-28. Biographical Note

Katherine Lispenard Seabury Crocker (1902-1984) was born in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. She married Edward Savage Crocker II (1898-1968) in 1923. Edward was a foreign service officer for the United States government, and was stationed at many locations throughout Latin America, Europe, and Asia throughout his career. The Crockers lived in Japan from 1934-1942 while Edward served as first secretary at the American embassy.

Scope and Contents

The collection consists of forty-five (45) Japanese maps collected by Lispenard Seabury Crocker while stationed with her husband in Japan in the 1930s. The maps are woodblock prints, drawings, and photomechanical prints dating from the late seventeenth through the early twentieth centuries. They have been mounted on cloth and/or paper backing and descriptive titles in English were affixed to the mounts by the collector.

Please note that the contents of the collection and the language and terminology used reflect the context and culture of the time of its creation. As an historical document, its contents may be at odds with contemporary views and terminology and considered offensive today. The information within this collection does not reflect the views of the Smithsonian Institution or National Anthropological Archives, but is available in its original form to facilitate research.

There is also a handwritten poem in Chinese ideographs, perhaps by a Buddhist devotee, signed Issen donin and dated "Horeki kino-to-u" (the year of the hare during the Horeki period [1757-1763]).

An English label misidentifies the location of Rakanji as Nagasaki Prefecture (it is located in Otia Prefecture).

The map depicts Tōkaidō, the road extending from Edo (Tokyo) to Kyoto and passing through the provinces bordering on the Pacific Ocean. The map is a bird's-eye view of the region and is decorated with sketches of houses, fields, boats, and so forth.

The painter and printmaker Hokusai was known by his principal gō (nom de plume) from 1797 to 1820; by Katsushika from circa 1807 to 1824; and by Taitō from 1811 to 1820. The map is signed "Katsushika zen Hokusai" (Katsushika known previously as Hokusai). The date of the map is suggested, therefore, to be between 1820 and 1824.

Included is a chart that shows distances from the Nihombashi area to local temples, shrines, and other points of interest. A colophon identifies the publisher, place,

and date of the map.

It is said to have been built four years before Christ and contains the sacred mirror, one of the imperial emblems.
