### **Biographical Note**

John Hale Fouch (1849-1933) served as the first post photographer at Fort Keogh, Montana Territory, opening his own studio as early as 1877. He photographed Chief Joseph after his surrender and imprisonment and may have been the first to photograph the battlefield at Little Big Horn. He established studios in Minnesota after leaving

Montana in the late 1870s and continued his photographic work until about 1900, after which he moved to California and became a real estate agent.

## Scope and Contents

Copies of photographs depicting Little Powder, an Arapaho chief; High Backbone, a Cheyenne Indian, or Hump, a Sioux Indian married to a Cheyenne woman; Chief Joseph, October 1877; and Jim, also called Osch-Tish, a two-spirit Crow Indian seated next to a Crow woman.
