Summary:	A New York bookseller, Warshaw assembled this collection over nearly fifty years. The <i>Warshaw Collection of Business Americana: Genealogy</i> forms part of the Warshaw Collection of Business Americana, Subseries 1.1: Subject Categories. The Subject Categories subseries is divided into 470 subject categories based on those created by Mr. Warshaw. These subject categories include topical subjects, types or forms of material, people, organizations, historical events, and other categories. Genealogy is a portion of the Business Ephemera Series of the Warshaw Collection of Business Americana, Accession AC0060 purchased from Isadore Warshaw in 1967. Warshaw continued to accumulate similar material until his death, which was donated in 1971 by his widow, Augusta. For a period after acquisition, related materials from other sources (of mixed provenance) were added to the collection so there may be content produced or published after Warshaw's death in 1969. This practice has since ceased.

Processing Information

In 2016, with funding provided by the Smithsonian Institution's Collections Care and Preservation Fund, the Archives Center at the National Museum of American History implemented the use of minimal level processing standards to increase information about and facilitate access to more of our collections. A large portion of stored material from the original acquisition received minimal level processing, which resulted in additions to this Subject category. This effort included basic arrangement and replacement of non-archival housing for long-term stability, but staples and other fasteners have not all been removed. Revisions to the encoded finding aid were made to reflect the added content in context to the previously processed material.

Scope and Contents

This material consists of the papers and products of individual genealogists, genealogical societies, family associations, and businesses engaged in the study or trade of genealogy and heraldry. Items in this collection include personal papers, organizational papers, family trees, family registers, photographs, professional journals, handbooks, historical narratives, advertisements, and products samples. Researchers interested in the practice and study of genealogy in the United States will find these materials useful. There is also some documentation of foreign companies and individuals involved in the study and trade of genealogy. These materials document how genealogical research was done and where genealogists received their information. The bulk of the material dates from circa 1880 to circa 1920 and is from the Northeastern United States.

Subseries 1: Individual Genealogists, circa 1833-1928

Scope and Contents: This subseries includes the personal papers of individuals engaged in the study of their ancestry and family history. Among these materials, there are historical narratives, family trees, family registers, photographs, correspondence, and documentation of family births, marriages, and deaths. The bulk of these materials consist of the personal papers of Frederic C. Torrey, a genealogist located in Lakehurst, New Jersey. He corresponded with numerous Torrey family members from across the United States. His papers include correspondence (circa 1890-1916), historical narratives about the Torrey family, family trees, family questionnaires, detailed information about Torrey family births, marriages, and deaths, and other miscellaneous items. Peter C. Schuyler's papers include correspondence with Schuyler family members (circa 1883-1884), historical narratives about the Schuyler family, tombstone inscriptions, and detailed information about Schuyler family births, marriages, and deaths. It is unclear where Peter C. Schuyler lived. Walter Freemont Mead was a genealogist from Troy, New York. His papers include correspondence (1908-1928), personal notes, newspaper clippings, photographs, family registers, and materials related to his involvement with the New York Society of Sons of the Revolution. The Read family materials included in this series were not compiled by a specific genealogist; however, they do document some historical information about the Read family through correspondence, photographs, and other notes.

Subseries 2: Genealogical Societies and Family Associations, circa 1847-1939

Scope and Contents: This subseries includes the professional journals, handbooks, by-laws, certificates of incorporation, officers, historical narratives, publications, services, mailing lists, and correspondence associated with societies and clubs dedicated to the study of genealogy and heraldry. This series also includes family reunion notifications, meeting information, and newsletters associated with the Eaton, Hickman, Reade, Robinson, Rockefeller, Sanford family associations. The majority of these organizations are located in New England with a few exceptions in Nashville, Tennessee, Lumberton, North Carolina, and Paris, France.

Subseries 3: Genealogical Businesses, circa 1875-1946

Scope and Contents: includes the advertisements, correspondence, and product samples of individuals and businesses engaged in genealogical trade. Their services and products included genealogical resources, books, research guides, and prepared family histories. The majority of these businesses are located in New York, Ohio, Maryland, New Jersey, and London, England. The Lawrence-Townley Estate materials include the records of individuals and businesses working to document their right or the rights of others to the Lawrence-Townley Estate (also known as Chase-Townley). The individuals and companies include F. Alden Hill and Dr. Alfred Shephard located in Glendale, Ohio; Jasiel Lawrence of Rome, New York; James Usher of New York, New York (Chase-Townley); and the Townley Estates Realization Company located in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Subseries 4: General Information, circa late 1800s

Scope and Contents: This subseries includes photographs, drawings, and engravings of various people, correspondence from various individuals studying the genealogy of different families (circa 1833-1946), the research papers and notes of individuals studying various genealogical family lines, and historic familial information including historical narratives, notices of family reunions, baptismal records, military records, ornate family trees, and family registers. Most of the photographs, drawings, and engravings are of the Butler family (circa 1800's). There is also a Buckley family photograph and two unidentified photographs. There is a large and ornate family tree documenting the lineage of Major General Robert Sedgwick (1613-1656); he is said to be one of the first Sedgwicks to arrive in America. The miscellaneous folder contains a picture of the arms of Henry Hudson, founder and 1st assistant of the Muscovy Company; a blank family fact form of unknown origin; and a sheet of paper with pictures of the Elsass, Lothringen, Nanzig, Strasburg, Metz, and Verdun coat of arms.
