Glassware is a portion of the Business Ephemera Series of the Warshaw Collection of Business Americana, Accession AC0060 purchased from Isadore Warshaw in 1967. Warshaw continued to accumulate similar material until his death, which was donated in 1971 by his widow, Augusta. For a period after acquisition, related materials from other sources (of mixed provenance) were added to the collection so there may be content produced or published after Warshaw's death in 1969. This practice has since ceased.

Processing Information

In 2016, with funding provided by the Smithsonian Institution's Collections Care and Preservation Fund, the Archives Center at the National Museum of American History implemented the use of minimal level processing standards to increase information about and facilitate access to more of our collections.

For this subject, minimal processing included arrangement to the folder level, based on prior processing and preservation action, with retention of the pre-existing arrangement when possible, if applicable. Otherwise, an order was imposed by the Processing Archivist. Some materials were consolidated to eliminate excess bulk but items within folders were not arranged further. The guide may or may not include a more refined list of folder contents. Nonarchival housing was replaced for long-term stability, but staples and other fasteners have not all been removed.

Scope and Contents

Covers glassware in its many forms and application including in building design and sculpture, both as a structural and an aesthetic component, in lighting, in art as a medium and as a method to protect and display art (picture frames, cases, etcetera.), in industry (insulators, electronics), in transportation (lighthouses, railroad signal glasses, headlamps), and in science with medical and lab supplies and instruments, and equipment such as telescopes. Daily and practical use consumer products feature prominently in the form of household and decorative goods (jarring, canning, dish and serving ware, daily and special use), windows, lamps and lighting, storage of liquids and solids, including detergents, medicine storage, plus beverages and foodstuffs, and cleaning of glass. Colored, ornamental, ground, etched, leaded, stained, and mosaic glasswork related material appears sporadically. China and other ceramic and pottery breakable wear is sometimes categorized along with clear, cut, opaque, and colored glass. Related aspects, such as stoppers, are also included.

Collection materials represent a sampling of businesses and products. The Patent and Design folder has numerous submission summaries, along with schematics, some hand drawn, and a few blueprints, mostly related to bottle design. A limited amount of industry publications and union documents are present, especially for the Glass Workers.

Container Listing

Business Records and Marketing Material, 1804-1965

Scope and Contents: Contains a variety of material including correspondence, receipts and transactional documents, advertisements, price lists, a few catalogs and booklets, mostly focused on consumer products. Some materials refer to company history or may contain illustrations of their manufacturing facilities.

Corning Glass Works

Notes: Corning credits itself as the first glass company to partner with scientists to forge research and innovation in the use of glass for multiple applications. Some of its well-known consumer products include the "unbreakable" Chemcor and Pyrex. Corning cast the largest piece of glass in the shape of disk measuring 200 inches and weighing 20-tons for use in the Hale Telescope at Palomar Mountain in California. The company operates a Museum in New York where ancient and contemporary glass is on display, along with an unsuccessful second telescope disk.

Notes: Brochure introducing the casting of the mirror. B&W photos the ceramic mold with noted contributors: Dr. George V. McCauley, John L. Thomas, the mirror in transit with Drs. J.C. Hostetter and George V. McCauley, and one image of just the mold. Numerous news clippings (most featuring one of two stock photos) show the nationwide publicity of the move of the disk from New York to California.

Notes: Miscellaneous documents: two shipping receipts (1869, 1878), one letter in reply to Warshaw re: research (1965), one inspection ticket (undated, blank). No other business records are present.
