

Summary:	Field notes, manuscripts, photographs, booking contracts, correspondence, personal papers, newspaper clippings, magazine articles, interviews, and other research materials primarily relating to the history of American blues music. Collection documents the lives of significant blues musicians Robert Johnson, Blind Lemon Jefferson, Lightnin' Hopkins, and Mance Lipscomb; insight into the life, writings, and research practices of Robert "Mack" McCormick; and the business side of recording and selling the blues.

Biographical / Historical

Robert Burton "Mack" McCormick (August 3, 1930-November 18, 2015) was a self-taught folklorist who spent a lifetime researching, collecting, and writing about vernacular music in the United States. Most of his work focused on the blues and other musical traditions of Black, brown, and white communities living throughout Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama. After experiencing a difficult, transient childhood and eventually dropping out of high school, McCormick settled in Houston, Texas and began to work a series of odd jobs while relentlessly pursuing his goal of becoming a successful writer. Although researching and writing about music came to occupy most of his time, he also pursued passions as a screenwriter and novelist. The volume of historical research and personal interviews he conducted from the 1950s through the early 1970s is remarkable, and his published writings during this period about music and the musicians he doggedly studied were lauded by his peers as among the best in the field. Along the way he worked for a time as a manager for the careers of the Texas songsters Sam "Lightnin" Hopkins and Mance Lipscomb, and briefly ran his own record label. He made hundreds of hours of field recordings with musicians living throughout the South. He collaborated with colleagues such as Chris Strachwitz, founder of Arhoolie Records, and Paul Oliver, with whom McCormick spent over a decade researching and writing a manuscript on the history of Texas Blues. Beginning in the late 1960s, he was contracted by the Smithsonian Institution as a field worker for its annual Festival of American Folklife, and around the same time began researching the life of blues legend Robert Johnson for a manuscript that McCormick wrote and re-wrote but failed to publish in his lifetime.

McCormick's research, along with his personal archive, became the stuff of legend among fellow blues researchers and enthusiasts, particularly after his publishing output dwindled in the 1970s. He lived with a bipolar disorder that drew him into bouts of depression and paranoia. He came to distrust many of those colleagues working most closely with him, and sometimes shared untrue information to throw them off the trail of his research discoveries. He also "borrowed" heirloom photographs from the family members and descendants of blues artists and, in several cases documented in this collection, he refused to return them. Overcome with challenges that lay both within and without his control, he came to describe the massive archive in his Houston, Texas home as "the monster," and spent his final decades attempting with little success to publish his writings.

Scope and Contents

The collection documents the life, writings, research practices, and business activities of blues scholar Robert "Mack" Burton McCormick who came to serve as a leading authority on the genre. Personal papers include diaries, curriculum vitae, biographical sketches, school papers, employment documents, correspondence, financial records, and an interview transcript. McCormick's writings consist of published magazine and journal articles, plays, essays, television scripts, short stories, and album liner notes. There are complete unpublished manuscripts, drafts with notes and research materials, and ideas for future work. McCormick's research practices and subjects of interest are documented in correspondence, field notes, annotated maps, newspaper clippings, magazine articles, city directories, interviews, photographic prints, negatives, slides, and contact sheets. American blues, Texas blues, and the music of significant blues artists, who McCormick served as an agent and manager for, dominated his extensive research efforts. In addition, the collection documents the recording, distribution and sale, and identification of consumer markets for American music in correspondence, contracts, agreements, music journals, publicity and promotional materials, music manuscripts, and interviews.

Throughout the collection preservation measures were performed to ensure long term use of the materials. Newspaper clippings were photocopied, and the originals were discarded. Audio cassette tapes have been reformatted and the digital copies will soon be available for research use.

Scope and This series contains photographic prints, negatives, contact sheets, and slides. It also contains photographic materials related to McCormick's proposed publications, as well as photographic material created by other photographers. Folder titles reflect McCormick's original headings.

Subseries 1.1: Photographic Negatives and Contact Sheets, 1967-1977, undated

Scope and Contents: This subseries consists of McCormick's black and white, photographic negative files and contact sheets. McCormick designated each file with an "F" number that corresponds to a matching contact sheet with the same "F" number. There is also an "M" and a "C" series of negatives but apparently without corresponding contact sheets. Not all sleeves contained negatives, and none was dated. Folders and sleeves numbered from 349-352 were empty. This subseries contains McCormick's original contact sheets and accompanying notes. They are arranged numerically according to McCormick's original numbering. Digital contact sheets are not copies of McCormick's originals but created from his negatives using his numbering system.

Scope and This series consists of materials assembled by McCormick for his Texas Blues research project, 1957-1971. Subseries 6.1: Texas Blues Research, 1910-2010, undated

Scope and This subseries contains research for a manuscript project titled *The Texas Blues*. The materials consist of typescript and handwritten correspondence, primarily between Paul Oliver and Mack McCormick, typescript notes and references, typescript notes of interviews with individuals, newspaper clippings, and photocopied secondary sources.

McCormick assembled the research into binders known as Volumes 1-5. There are indices for volumes two-four that McCormick completed in August 1965. Additional indices include a supplementary index and subject index. Each page of this research is numbered in the upper right corner and the pages are arranged sequentially. In some instances, McCormick removed pages from sequential order, filing them in subject or artist files, presumably for cross references. When possible, the processing archivist restored the original pages and made photocopies for the other files. Many of the pages are annotated by McCormick either directly on the page or by using a sticky-note. All sticky-notes were photocopied and then removed for preservation reasons.

McCormick's "Author's Preface" for the manuscript *The Texas Blues*, contains insight and details about McCormick's motivations to undertake research about the blues, his research methodology, the sources he consulted, his collaborators, especially Paul Oliver, and the use of terms "Black" vs. "Afro-American" or "Cajun" vs. "Acadian." McCormick noted that, "the book is not complete and, in a sense, never can be." (Author's preface, page 7) Some of the sources McCormick consulted included, telephone directories, court records, police records, death certificates, city directories, maps, statistical data about Texas, employment histories of musicians, and speaking with individuals who had contact with musicians, such as hotel and bar owners. McCormick wrote that, "the greatest single resource of valuable material is undoubtedly the commercial recordings."(Author's Preface, page 19) McCormick obtained dubbings or taped transcriptions of many early recordings from blues collectors which allowed him to trace influences, phrases, and texts for blues musicians. One of the greatest obstacles was the physical separation of McCormick (in Texas) and Oliver (in England), their reliance on mail to communicate their research, and the drain on their personal finances.

McCormick by the early 1960s was concerned that some colleagues and collaborators, including Paul Oliver, may attempt to publish his research without his permission. For this reason, he began to place "hoaxes" in his research materials. For useful context pertaining to McCormick's planting of hoaxes (and how to identify them), see the Editor's Preface and Afterword in Robert "Mack" McCormick, Biography of a Phantom: a Robert Johnson Blues Odyssey, edited by John W. Troutman (Washington DC: Smithsonian Books, 2023).

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Series 7: Robert Johnson, 1910-2015, undated

Scope and This series is the result of many years of extensive research and collecting data for what was to be a definitive publication relating to the life of bluesman Robert Johnson. Tentatively titled "The Biography of a Phantom," McCormick settled on the title who "Killed Robert Johnson" (WKRJ) connecting many threads of the story by marking his research files with "WKRJ." The series is divided into two subseries: Subseries 7.1: Research, and Subseries 7.2: Who Killed Robert Johnson manuscript dating from 1955-2015.

Archivists and curators have encountered unverifiable and sometimes suspect information in McCormick's research materials and manuscript drafts pertaining to Robert Johnson; it is apparent that McCormick sometimes falsified documents and in other instances deliberately planted false information within his research materials and manuscript drafts. More specifically, while McCormick's original recordings and notes associated with his 1972 interviews with Johnson's sisters Carrie Thompson and Bessie Hines have been removed from public access pending an ongoing Ethical Returns investigation, along with the portions of his manuscript drafts that drew from them, in later manuscript versions and notes found in Series 7.1 and 7.2, McCormick fabricated observations and stories from those interviews, at times with an aim to thwart potential litigation directed at him, and/or to challenge various family members' heirship claims to the estate of Robert Johnson. Caution thus is warranted, and independent verification encouraged before relying upon the findings reported in these research notes and book manuscript drafts, particularly regarding McCormick's interactions with Robert Johnson's family members. Scope and This series includes audio cassette tapes created by Robert "Mack" McCormick primarily in support Contents: of his research for his writings. Most of the research tapes are interviews, largely conducted on the telephone, with a few exceptions done in the home of the interviewee. These interviews were conducted by McCormick as an employee of the Smithsonian Institution, Library of Congress, or as an independent researcher. Audio cassette tapes, recorded as dictation of notes for unfinished manuscripts, include thoughts on additional research to pursue and typing instructions. A small number of tapes are related to McCormick as an individual and provide biographical information or insight into his private thoughts, professional work, and concern about his writings and collection. Many of these tapes have been digitized by the Archives Center. Some tapes were sent out to professional audio labs due to the condition of the items. Many of the tapes were digitized as one program without an indication as to whether it was side one or side two of the tape. Other tapes were digitized using the division of side one and side two. Numbers were assigned to each tape and the material was later arranged in chronological order. Abstracts were created by Archives Center staff for all digitized audio cassette tapes. These abstracts were made from the digital files and not the original audio cassette tapes. Sound and content quality of the tapes differ depending on how, where, and when they were created. Content of the audio cassettes primarily relate to music, research on Robert Johnson (interviews with his family and acquaintances), and McCormick himself. Much of the content covered in the audio cassette tapes can be found in documents in the collection. McCormick often makes references to files in the collection that include more information on a particular subject. Researchers are advised to consult the documents in the collection for more detailed notes as the original audio cassette tapes are not available for research use.

Some of the interviews are restricted from use pending investigation under the Smithsonian Institution's Ethical Returns and Shared Stewardship Policy.

McCormick calls Majors as part of his research to find relatives of Robert Johnson's mother Julia Majors Dodds. Mrs. Majors informs McCormick that she does not have a relative named Julia Majors.

McCormick calls Olft as part of his research to find relatives of Robert Johnson. Olft informs McCormick that he is not related to Julia Majors. Check the tape on this one.

McCormick interviews Mrs. Homer Eugene Oertle, sister-in-law of Brunswick Records salesman Ernest (Ernie) Monroe Oertle (1890-1941), on the telephone as part of his research for the Smithsonian Institution. He is working on a project to document how the company salesmen discovered unique talent in the 1930s and arranged for them to go to the Texas studios for recording sessions. Mrs. Oertle informs McCormick that she had no information relating to Mr. Oertle's business activities. She also had very little biographical information to offer about the family of her husband, Homer Eugene Oertle (1888-1957), other than the fact that they had immigrated from Switzerland and settled in Pittsburgh, Kansas where the brothers grew up.

Tomas Acuna interview, undated.

McCormick briefly speaks on the telephone with Tomas Acuna and his daughter who are in San Antonio, Texas. McCormick wants to gather from Acuna, a Brunswick Records employee who organized recording sessions, information for his research relating to recording in the 1930s. He asks Acuna the questions through his daughter who then relates the answers to McCormick.

Acuna informs McCormick that he was involved in recording sessions in San Antonio's Gunter Hotel on the second floor. The conversation is ended with the intention of continuing the discussion later.

S. R. Leatherman interview, October 1, 1973.

McCormick interviews Samuel Richard Leatherman Jr. on the telephone as part of his research relating to culture along the Mississippi River area and some of the older plantations. Leatherman (1903-) began managing the Abby/Leatherman Plantation in 1926 which started as 8,000-9,000 acres of land for the growing of hay, cotton, and corn. He inherited the property from his father Samuel Richard Leatherman who inherited it from the original owners great grandfather Richard Abby and his brother Anthony Abby. Leatherman describes the land, the family home, and the families who worked there. Hugh Fontaine, Leatherman's brother-in-law, operated the plantation for a while and started the Memphis Hunt and Polo Club. He also provides McCormick with information relating to how labor is acquired for the plantation, the number of people living on the property, social activities, and musicians who played for the workers.

McCormick conducts telephone interview with Wiley in reference to his work with the Library of Congress (LC) and the recording of a song relating to the Wreck of 97. The Library of Congress (LC) was releasing a recording of the song about the event which had never been heard. Wiley, born November 1886 near Chatham, recounts the events as he saw it. He states that himself and Ethel Foust are the only eyewitnesses to the event. McCormick is fact checking a story that came out about him.

Corrine Forsyth Harter interview, undated.

McCormick conducts telephone interview with Forsyth Harter in reference to his work with the Library of Congress (LC) which is including the song *Mountain Meadow Massacre* sang by George Harder in an anthology. McCormick is writing the notes for the song and gathering information relating to George Harder. Forsyth Harter is the daughter-in-law of Harder and she informs McCormick that Harder never joined the Mormon church and that he learned the song in Utah. It is a song, according to Forsyth Harter, about Native Americans attacking and killing people living on a ranch owned by her uncle Thomas Forsyth.

According to Morante the song was recorded in San Antonio, Texas about two weeks after JKF was assassinated.
