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Biographical / Historical

Thomas Bailey Marquis (1869-1935) was born on a farm in Missouri. His father bought a share of the local newspaper and sent Thomas and his older brother Birney to learn the printing trade. While working as a printer in St. Joseph, Missouri, Marquis became interested in the West. He moved to Helena, Montana, continued working as a printer, and met Native Americans for the first time. In 1894, Marquis began medical school to have a steadier career; his private practice was a mixed success. He volunteered with the Army Medical Corps during World War I and treated influenza in England when the war ended. He eventually returned to the U.S. and worked as an Indian agency physician with the Civil Service Commission first for the Northen Cheyenne, then for the Apsáalooke (Crow/Absaroke). He wrote about his experiences with Native Americans and published some of his stories. Marquis was a self-taught historian who had a special interest in the Battle of Little Bighorn. He published multiple books and photographs on Plains Indians and General Custer.

Scope and Contents

This collection contains eight black and white, 3x5 inch or smaller, photographs of Dr. Thomas B. Marquis during his time as an agency physician for Northern Tsitsistas/Suhtai (Cheyenne) and the Apsáalooke (Crow/Absaroke). Explanatory notes on each photograph were glued to the prints, likely by Dr. Marquis, before sending them to the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation. These original notes have been included in the descriptions.

snapshot, made nine-and-a-half years ago, when I was age 51 1/2, depcits my gymnastic capabilities at that time. I could vault the pole shown, at heaght of 4ft. 10 in. During later years I have not done any gymnasium work, but I do a great deal of walking. I keep myself gaunt and flat-bellied. Perfect trim, excellent health, at all times. I fear I'll

never be eligible for old-soldier pension."

One 4x7 in. black and white photograph. Attached note" This wall of my office reception-room holds many of my Custer-battle Indian relics, but not all of them. Since this photo was made I have obtained some additional ones. Also, only two Custer-soldier rifles are shown here, while I own six of them. The other four are loaned out for public display. Each separate display article on my wall has attached to it a placard telling its particular story. Usually, photo of the Indian from whom it was obtained is attached. The large placards tell, in general, of the reason why the Cheyennes had these articles and kept them hidden away so long.

Beginning at left: three ammunition belts taken from Custer soldiers killed June 25, 1876. Then at top, pouch made from bootleg of a Custer soldier. Next, carbine rifle captured by Big Beaver from a Custer soldier. Next, above, buffalo-skin hat worn by warrior Indian as a medicine charm. Next, carbine rifle captured by White Moon from a Custer soldier killed. next, middle, bottle of loaded cartridges from Custer rifles (reloaded, not same as used in the battle). Next, above, revolver captured by White Elk from a Custer soldier. Next, to right, saddlebags captured by Bobtail Horse from a Custer soldier. Then, to left and below, scalping knife of a Sioux. Upper right, Dr. Marquis' map showing various campaigns of Custer- in Kansas, Texas, Nebraska, the Dakotas, and Montana during various years 1867-1876. Just below my large map, at its lower left corner, Russell White Bear's Custer-battlefield map. At lower right-hand corner of picture, a calendar reproduction of some oil-painting copy I have some typewritten comment, headed "WHAT IS WRONG WITH THIS PICTURE?" and i point out many features wherein it mistakenly depicts the scene."

One 3.5x5.5 in. black and white photograph. Attached note: "I attended all of the events during the 50th anniversary celebration of Custer battle. As the parade of veterans of Indian wars came up the hill I had a position near the monument. Thousands of other people were on the hill. Many photographers were busy. A ffew months later I was astonished to find this postcard and others like it on sale. Some photographer had operated just behind me. The straw-hatted figure in the left foreground is a back view of Dr. Marquis. So I have clear proof that I attended that celebration."
