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Biographical / Historical

Estrella Lake Montgomery (1908-2006) was born in Brule, Wisconsin. She was married to George W. Montgomery and had one son, William D. Montgomery. Montgomery worked as a photojournalist and author.

Scope and Contents

This collection contains twelve 8x10 in. black and white photographs taken by Estrella Lake Montgomery during her travels in Central and South America and a freelance photojournalist. On the back of each photograph is a description written by Montgomery and is included under the individual listing. Some of the culture terms used are outdated and the descriptions are Montgomery's opinions and do not reflect the views of the National Museum of the American Indian.

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photograph showing a group

of women and young children. The women are chewing corn. Montgomery is pictured standing on the right. The note from Montgomery says "A human brewery in operation. The Goajira women sit around in a circle chewing kernels of corn into a mash which they then spit into a receptacle. When this is full, it is dumped into the large crock, water is added and the mess is left in the sun to ferment. This makes a powerful alcoholic beverage. Author's face shows stomach's reaction. Goajira Penninsula,

Colombia."

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photograph of a girl. Note on the

back says "Ticuna Indian girl weeps from ordeal of Pelazon, sadistic puberty hair pulling ceremony. Photo was posed with scissors as Colombian government forbids this part of ritual.

Ticuna Indians, Jungles of the Amazon."

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photo of a girl at her Pelazon

ceremony, surrounded by women. Note on the back says "The isolation hut where the girl spent three months is in the background. (Small hut made of thin slats, decorated with symbols.) Here the woman witch doctor who has charge of this part of the ceremony, helps the "bell of the ball" to her feet after her ordeal. Ceremonial rug is made of bark and painted with

symbols."

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photograph of a Ticuna hut.

Montgomery is on the ladder. Note on the back says "Ticuna huts are buils up on poles. There are no doors, windows or walls. The ladder is pulled up at night into the hut. Jungles, Amazon River."

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photograph of a woman weaving

a hammock with her baby. Montgomery looks on. Note on the back says "Indians of the arid Goajira Penninsula make expert hammocks on primitive looms. Their homes are built of poles with cactus roofs. Although they live by the shores of the Caribbean Sea, drinking water has to be transported from government-built

public water systems."

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photograph of one woman spinning

fiber and another weaving. Note on the back says "Primitive spinning and weaving at Santiago on Lake Atitlan in Guatemala. Designs in the fabrics are often very intricate and color past.

Indians descendants of Maya-Quiche tribes."

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white photograph of an outdoor

marketplace in Santiago, Guatemala. Montgomery stands in the middle. Note on the back says "Author mingles with the Natives in the colorful marketplace in Santiago, Guatemala. Note halo headdress of women. Useful in carrying jugs of water from Lake

Atitlan on their heads."

healer. Choco Indians of the Darien Province of Panama."

Photo-folder 3 P26032: Curing ceremony, circa 1950

Notes: One 8x10 in. black and white Emberá (Choikoi) photograph

depicting a group of people surrouding an ill man lying on the ground. Note on the back says "Choco Indian curing ceremony. Small, tent-like contraption is mini hospital of the medicine man who sits at the head of the patient rubbing his medicine sticks. The Choco Indians live in the jungles of the dangerous Darien

Province of Panama."

of a man holding a bag and dart roll. Note on the back says "Yagua Indian shows intricate and practical method of storing and carrying blow gun darts. The Yagua's grass skirt and other ornamentation had been dyed with a red coloring in honor of the

occasion of my visit."

kneeling with a bow and arrows. Note on the back says "Yagua Indian bow and arrows. Other Indian tribes in the Amazon region have adopted this type of weaponry. The Yaguas are most

proficient with long blow guns."
