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## **Biographical / Historical**

Drs. William Frank Nydegger (1915–1991) and Corinne Louise Nydegger Rosow (née Nemetz, 1930–2013) were cultural anthropologists known for their collaborative and individual contributions to the field. Together, they were one of six research teams in the influential *Six Cultures Project* and coauthored *Tarong: An Ilocos Barrio in the Philippines*, based on their fieldwork in the Philippines.

William F. Nydegger was active in mid-20th century anthropological research, while Corinne L. Nydegger Rosow had a distinguished academic career in medical anthropology, particularly at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF), where she served nearly two decades in the Department of Epidemiology and International Health. Corinne held degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Cornell University, and Pennsylvania State University, and completed postdoctoral fellowships at UC Berkeley and UCSF. Her pioneering work in human development and aging, especially in parent-child relationships in later life, significantly influenced the field of gerontology.

The Nydeggers studied Potawatami culture while at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

## **Scope and Contents**

This collection comprises seven photographic prints, five tintypes, and one handwritten notebook documenting the Potawatomi community in Wisconsin, circa 1870–1940. The materials include portraits and scenes of daily life. Many of the photographs and the notebook feature handwritten annotations, including names, contextual information, and text in an Indigenous language, presumed to be Potawatomi.

The following names appear: "Lowis W" (written twice), Lowis Wabenom (possibly Walenom), Frank Kabas (possibly Kakas) [illegible], and Louis Winsok (noted as Harry

Nebraska's brother).

Further research is needed to confirm the correct spellings and

identifications of the individuals named.

Notes: This small notebook is believed to have belonged to either William

Nydegger or Corinne Nydegger. It contains handwritten entries listing names of individuals, relationships, and other miscellaneous details. The notebook also served as a storage place for the tintypes included in this collection, with the entries identifying the sitters depicted in the

photographs.

Due to the challenging legibility of the handwriting, not all names are clearly decipherable. Some of the names may be transcribed

inaccurately. Additional research is needed.
