Summary: This collection consists of materials documenting the career of Beatrice

> Aitchison (1908-1997). Aitchison worked for the Post Office Department (POD) from 1953 until her retirement in June 1971. She held several positions there all of which involved directing research on transportation issues before eventually serving as the Director of Transportation Research in the Bureau of Transportation. Materials in this collection include Aitchison's curriculum vitae, writings related to her work on the Federal Woman's

Award Study Group on Careers for Women, award related documents, her retirement speech, photographs, articles and clippings, and a poster.

Conditions Governing Use

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Biographical / Historical

Beatrice Aitchison (1908-1997) was born in Portland, Oregon and attended private school there until 1916 when her family moved to Washington, D.C. She was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Goucher College in 1928, and received her masters (1931) and doctoral (1933) degrees in mathematics from Johns Hopkins University. Aitchison returned to Oregon in 1935 and in 1937 received her second masters degreee in economics from the University of Oregon. When she returned to Washington, D.C. in 1937 she lectured in statistics at American University until 1939. She also worked as a member of the faculty of the graduate school of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and starting in 1938 held temporary assignments at the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC). Aitchison returned to the University of Oregon in 1939 as an economics instructor, but still continued her temporary assignments with the ICC during her summers. In 1942 she resigned from her position at the University of Oregon and began her career with the federal government as a transportation economist, first with the ICC, where between 1942-1946 she was promoted from junior to senior statistician and then from 1948-1951 served as principal transportation economist. From 1942-1945 she was a consultant and head of traffic analysis for the Office of Defense Transportation, and in 1950 she was a consultant to the director of military traffic at the Department of Defense. She was the director of the Transportation Economics Division of the Office of Transportation at the U.S. Department of Commerce from 1951-1953.

Starting in 1953 until her retirement in June 1971, Aitchinson worked for the Post Office Department (POD) in several positions all of which involved directing research on transportation issues. She would eventually serve as the Director of Transportation Research in the Bureau of Transportation. While working for the POD, Aitchison directed studies that proved that it would be less expensive to send mail by air rather than by train. In the 1960s she also lead a five-year study that lead to the renegotiation of contracts with air carriers which saved the government an estimated \$50 million a year. For her work in mail transportation Aitchison was honored in 1961 as one of six women chosen to receive the "Federal Woman's Award" from the United States Civil Service Commission.

As a result of receiving this award she became a member of the Federal Woman's Award Study Group on Careers for Women, a small group of award recipients that were appointed by President Lyndon B. Johnson that was successful in recommending that sex discrimination be added to the executive order banning discrimination in government employment. In 1970 Aitchison received a National Civil Service League Career Service Award as one of the top ten government workers of the year, the only woman in the group. Upon her retirement from the POD in June 1971, she was one of the highest-ranking women in the federal government. In addition to her work at the POD, she was a fellow of the American Statistical Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, as

well as helped found the American Society of Traffic and Transportation (later known as the American Society of Transportation and Logistics).
